National Religious Freedom Day

National Religious Freedom Day commemorates the day the Virginia Statute for Religious Freedom was signed on January 16, 1786. Thomas Jefferson's landmark statute became the basis for Congressman Fisher Ames' establishment clause of the First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution. In the United States, people of different faiths have equal rights to practice their religion or to not practice at all. The phrase "religious freedom" has become politicized and often misused in recent years, not just in the United States, but globally. So rather than using the day to defend one's own beliefs and, especially, to denigrate others, this is a moment to gain understanding, knowledge, and respect for different belief systems without feeling threatened by them.



Today in History



In 1991, Wilson Picket and Tina Turner were among the inductees into the 6th Rock and Roll Hall of Fame. Over the course of her career, Turner won 8 Grammy Awards. She received Kennedy Center honors in 2005 and a lifetime Grammy in 2018. Picket recorded more than 50 songs.

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DID YOU KNOW? Swim of a Lifetime

In 2006, Veljko Rogošić set a record for the world's longest swim by swimming 139 miles along the coast from Grado, Italy, to Riccione. At 65 years old, he completed this incredible journey wearing only swimming trunks and goggles in 50 hours. This remarkable achievement earned him a place in the Guinness World Records.

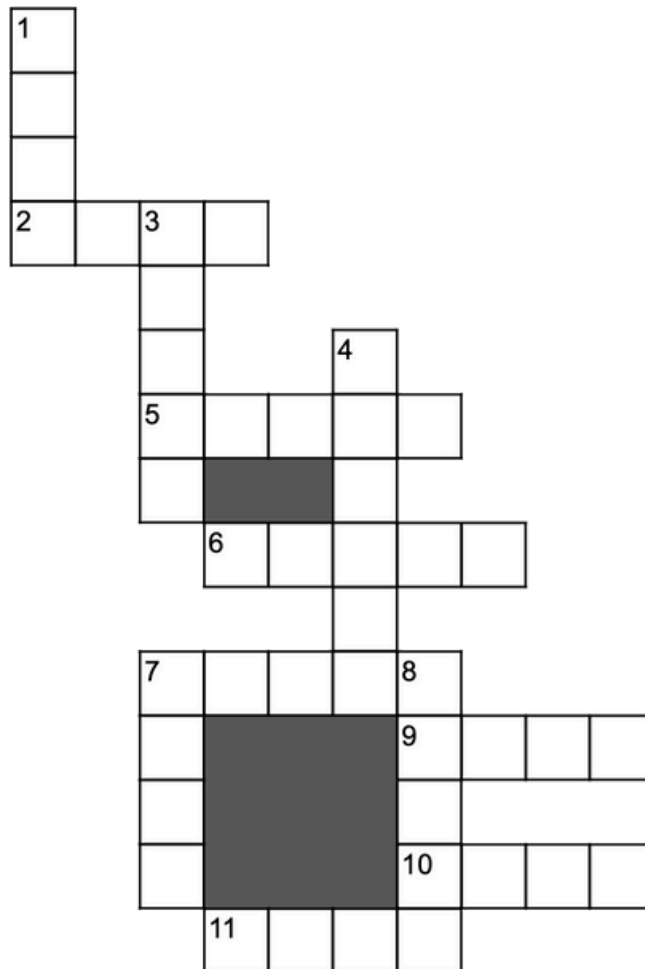
