Frozen Pizza Funeral

On March 5, 1973, hundreds gathered in Ossineke, Michigan, for a memorable event: a funeral for 30,000 frozen pizzas possibly tainted with toxins. The bizarre ceremony followed the discovery of spoiled mushroom tins at United Canning Company, leading to a recall by pizza maker Mario Fabbrini after two test mice died. Despite claims of botulism, further tests revealed the cause was likely peritonitis. Although he later won a lawsuit, Fabbrini sold his company in the early 1980s.

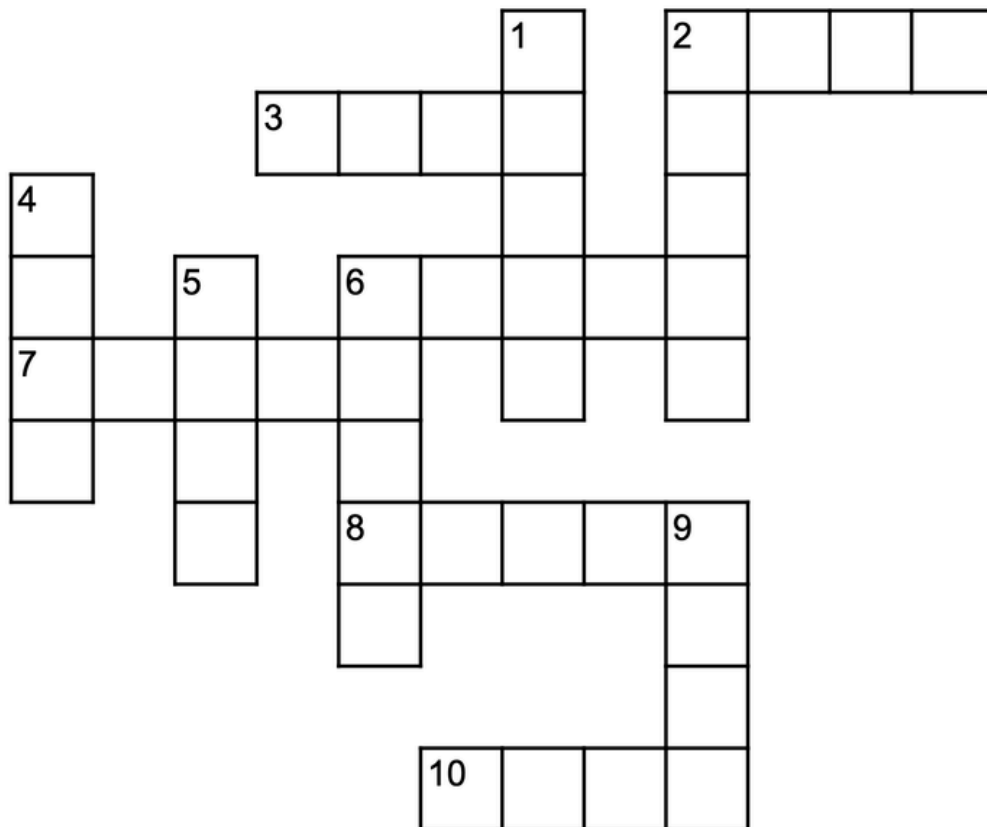

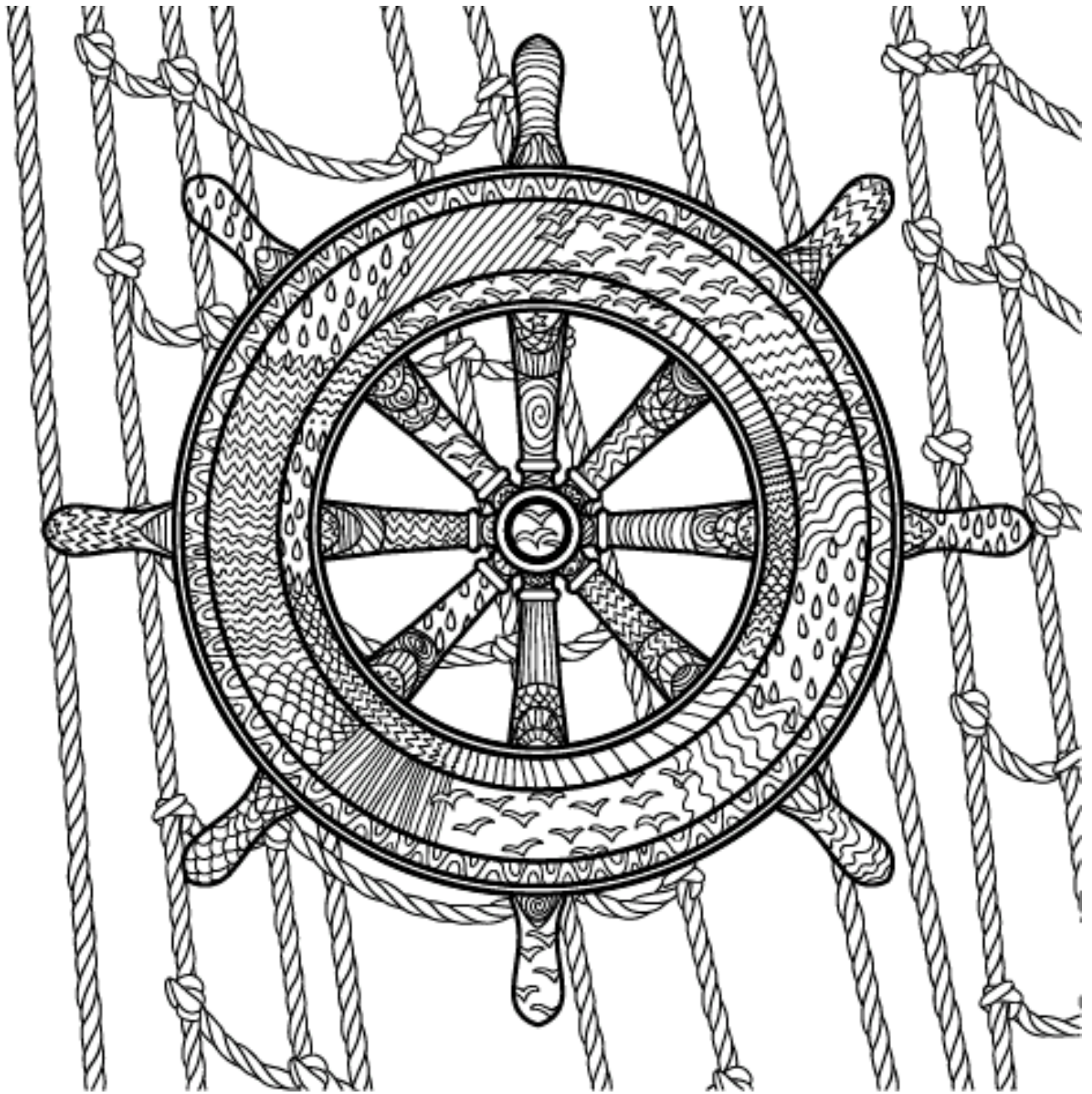
Use the following conversation prompts to start a discussion with friends or family! You may also use the provided lines to answer the questions on your own if you prefer.

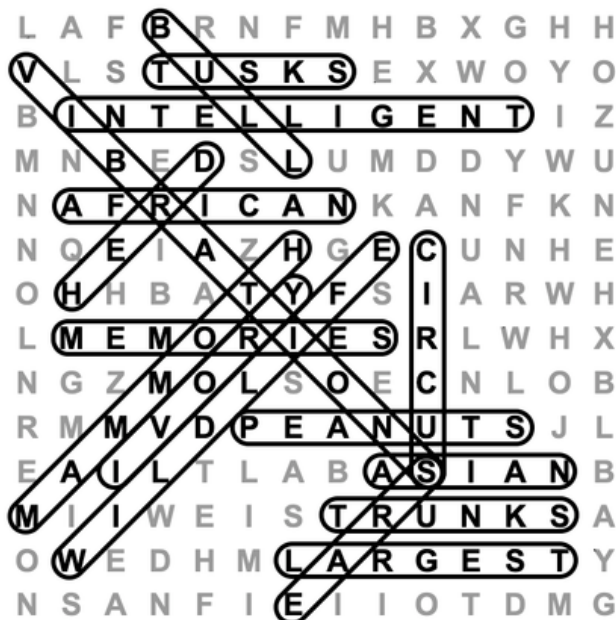




SOLUTIONS
