Bloomingdale's Inc. is a luxury department store chain founded in 1861 by Benjamin and Lyman Bloomingdale. Its iconic rounded logo debuted in 1972, followed a year later by its "Big Brown Bag" and "Little Brown Bag," all of which remain in use today. Bloomingdale's continued to thrive throughout the 1970s, despite New York City's turbulence at the time, partly via continued expansions into the suburbs.
