National Battery Day

From watches and cell phones to smoke detectors and cars, batteries are everywhere and vital to so many electronic devices that we depend on every day. In use since the 19th century, batteries were first created by Italian Scientist Alessandro Volta who, in 1800, layered silver, separated by paper and dipped in salt or acid and zinc to form the 'voltaic piles' which generated current and paved the way for William Cruickhank to mass produce batteries in 1802. Available in various shapes, sizes and capacities, the batteries of today are extremely versatile. On National Battery Day, take a moment to appreciate these mini powerhouses that help power our world.
