According to a recent Brewers Association report, Vermont leads in craft beer production per capita, with 20.1 gallons brewed for each drinking-age resident. The state boasts 78 craft breweries within its 9,616 square miles. In contrast, Mississippi ranks last in the nation, producing only 21,963 craft barrels in 2022. Kentucky, known as the bourbon capital, is also in the lower half, securing the No. 36 spot with 118,974 barrels produced.
