Croatia Geography

Croatia is about the same size as West Virigina, is located in Southeastern Europe, and has five countries that border it: Slovenia, Hungary, Serbia, Bosnia-Herzegovina, and Montenegro. It also borders the Adriatic Sea, which is the northernmost part of the Mediterranean Sea. The highest mountain is Dinara Peak, 6,004 ft. high at the border of Bosnia-Herzegovina. The longest river is the Sava with 350 miles. Lake Vrana in Dalmatia is the largest lake in the country. The coastline of the Mediterranean Sea is more than 1,100 miles long.

Famous Croatians

No matter what sector of society you look in - from actors to inventors - you're apt to find some famous Croatians! Match up these famous Croatia natives with their descriptions.

- This Croatian actress/singer was best known for her roles as the Minbari Ambassador Delenn in the science fiction series Babylon 5 (1993 - 1998), and as Danielle Rousseau in Lost (2004-2010).
- This man was "proud of his Serb origin and Croat homeland". His contribution to the world was immense, with over 300 international patents on his inventions. His most famous inventions were the alternating current (AC) motor and the development of AC generation and transmission technology.
- Born in Dalmatia before pursuing winemaking in California, His 1973 Chateau Montelena Chardonnay beat all the famous Burgundies. He was inducted into the Culinary Institute of America's Vintner's Hall of Fame in 2008.
- 4. Often considered one of the founders of modern seismology, this geophysicist was born in Opatija and worked as a teacher. After the deadly earthquake in Pokuplije in 1909, he dedicated himself to the studies of the composition and forces in the Earth's core.
- Probably the most famous Croatian actor on the world stage. He played the ER heartthrob. Dr. Luka Kovac, on television. He emigrated to the United States from Sibenik in the 1990s. He is also known for his role on NBC's Timeless as Garcia Flynn.




