# **Mel Brooks' Birthday**

Today, legendary writer, actor, producer, director, and all-around funnyman Mel Brooks has a birthday! The great mind behind "The Producers," "Young Frankenstein," "Blazing Saddles," and "Space Balls" is a member of the illustrious EGOT club, an entertainer who has won an Emmy, a Grammy, an Oscar, and a Tony. Only a handful of people have won the competitive EGOT, the "grand slam" of show business. In addition to Mel Brooks, other EGOT winners include Rita Moreno, Mike Nichols, and Audrey Hepburn.

Brooks also has a very distinctive star on Hollywood's Walk of Fame. When he cemented his handprints into the concrete on the walk, he added a prosthetic finger, so his handprints reflect eleven fingers, in typical goofy Brooks fashion.

In 1928, Louis Armstrong made the 78th recording of "West End Blues". Also known as "Satchmo," he remains one of the most famous and influential jazz musicians. Armstrong was inducted into the Downbeat Jazz Hall of Fame and the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, among others.

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# DID YOU KNOW? Historic Road Adventure

On May 23, 1903, Dr. Horatio Nelson Jackson and mechanic Sewall Crocker embarked on the first U.S. cross-country road trip, spurred by a \$50 wager to travel from San Francisco to New York in under 90 days. Averaging only 71 miles daily through rough terrain and encountering numerous challenges, they completed the journey in 63 days, arriving in New York on July 26, 1903, greeted by cheering crowds.

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
