

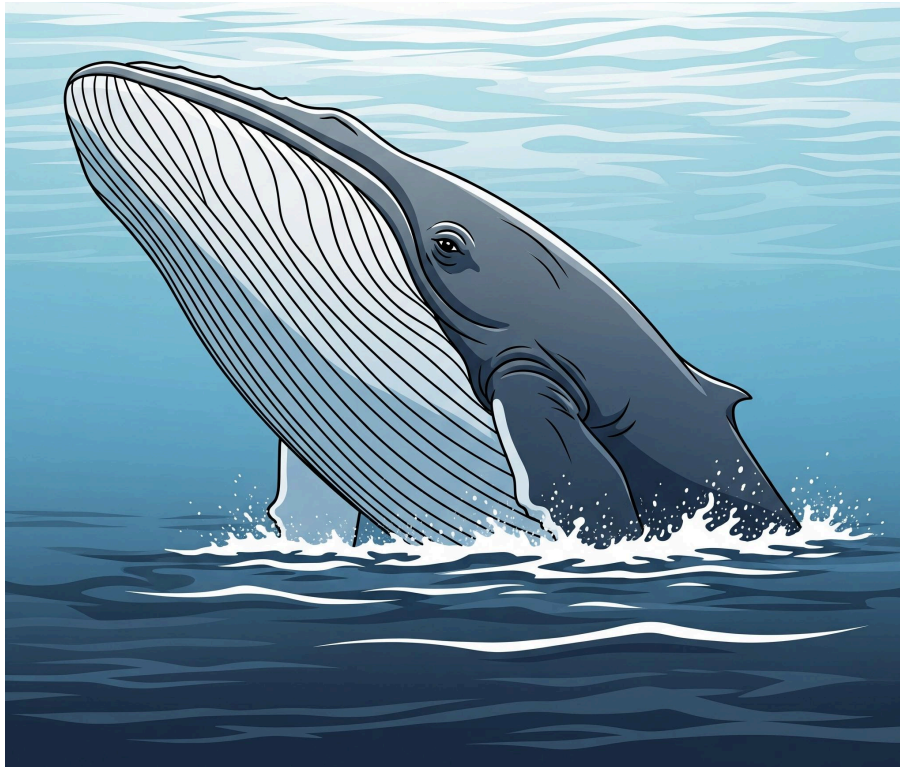
Cruise Week Trivia: All Aboard for Fun!
