Commemorating the birth of basketball inventor Dr. James Naismith, Play Basketball Day is a day to not only play one of the most popular sports in the U.S. but to celebrate its global impact. It was in December 1891 that Dr. Naismith invented basketball after being challenged by his boss to come up with a fair and non-aggressive game that could be played indoors during the cold Massachusetts winter.

In 1928, the St. Louis Cardinals' first baseman Jim Bottomley was voted the National League's MVP. After playing for three baseball teams from 1922 to 1937, he worked as a talent scout and minor league baseball manager. Bottomley was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1974.

The Origin of the Packers' Name

Did you know the Green Bay Packers, one of the most storied franchises in sports, got their name from a deal for jerseys? In 1919, team founder Earl "Curly" Lambeau asked his employer, the Indian Packing Company, for \$500 to buy uniforms. The company agreed on the condition that the team be named after them. While the Indian Packing Company was absorbed just two years later, the legendary "Packers" name stuck forever.


