## National Battery Day

From watches and cell phones to smoke detectors and cars, batteries are everywhere and vital to the many electronic devices we depend on every day. In use since the 19th century, batteries were first created by Italian scientist Alessandro Volta. In 1800, he layered silver and zinc, separated by paper dipped in salt or acid, to form the "voltaic pile," which generated current and paved the way for William Cruickshank to mass-produce batteries in 1802. Available in various shapes, sizes, and capacities, the batteries of today are extremely versatile. On National Battery Day, take a moment to appreciate these mini powerhouses that help power our world.




## Today in History




## Trivia Answer: A.
