U.S. Coast Guard Day

U.S. Coast Guard Day honors the military branch that protects our waters and shorelines. On August 4, 1790, the Revenue Cutter Service was created by the U.S. Congress. Congress authorized the construction of ten cutters. These ships were built to enforce U.S. tariff laws. The Revenue Cutter Service was the predecessor of the U.S. Coast Guard. The name “Coast Guard” was first used in 1915.

The U.S. Defense Department suggests that this day is largely an internal celebration for all Coast Guard personnel and their families, past and present. But we’d like to encourage everyone to honor the brave members of this important branch of the military, who are now playing an even more extensive role in Homeland Security to protect our country.

In 2021, the late Tony Bennett celebrated his 95th birthday with Lady Gaga in the first of two “Farewell” performances at Radio City Music Hall in New York City. He sold over 50 million records, won 20 Grammy Awards, was awarded a Kennedy Center Honor in 2005, and retired in 2021.

Someone You Should Know

Wilma Mankiller served as the principal chief of the Cherokee Nation for 10 years, becoming the first woman to do so. Known for her advocacy for improved education, health care, and housing services. Mankiller was recognized for her efforts to lower infant mortality rates and boost education. She was inducted into the National Women's Hall of Fame in 1993 and received the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1998. Mankiller continued to advocate for women's rights and Indigenous rights until her passing in 2010 at age 64.

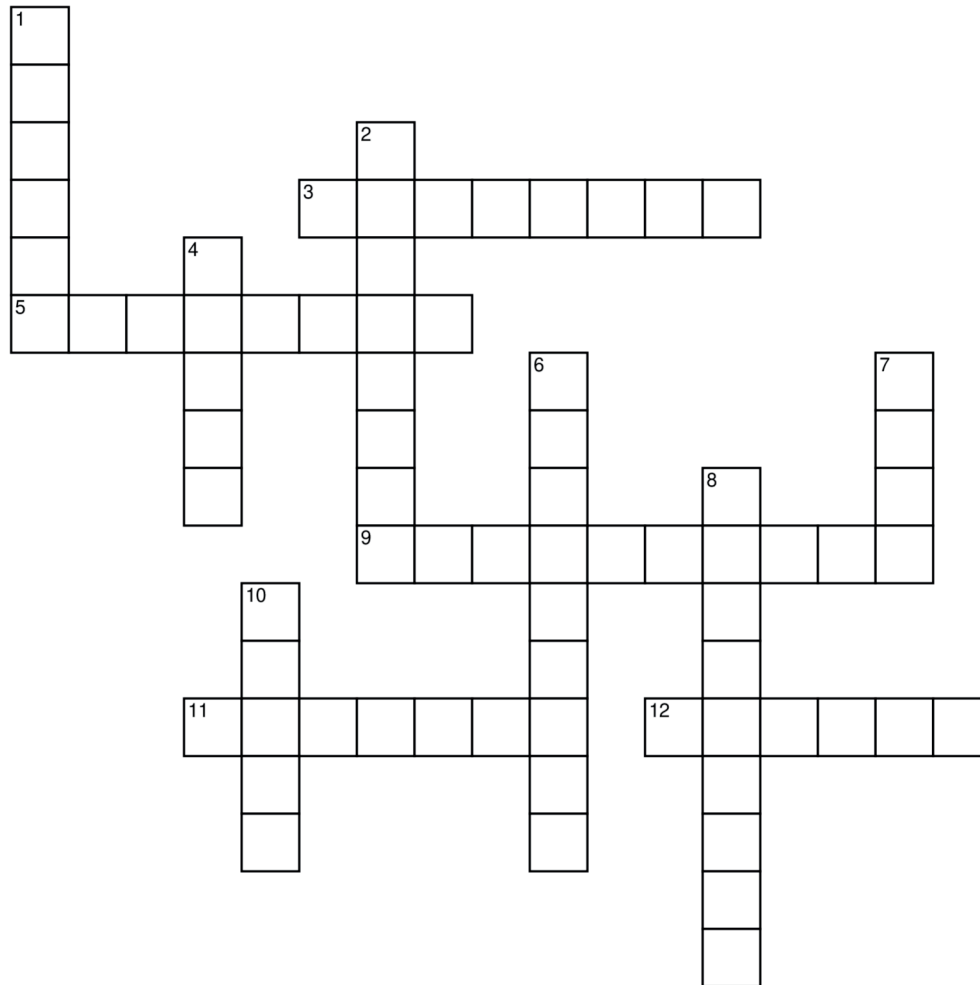

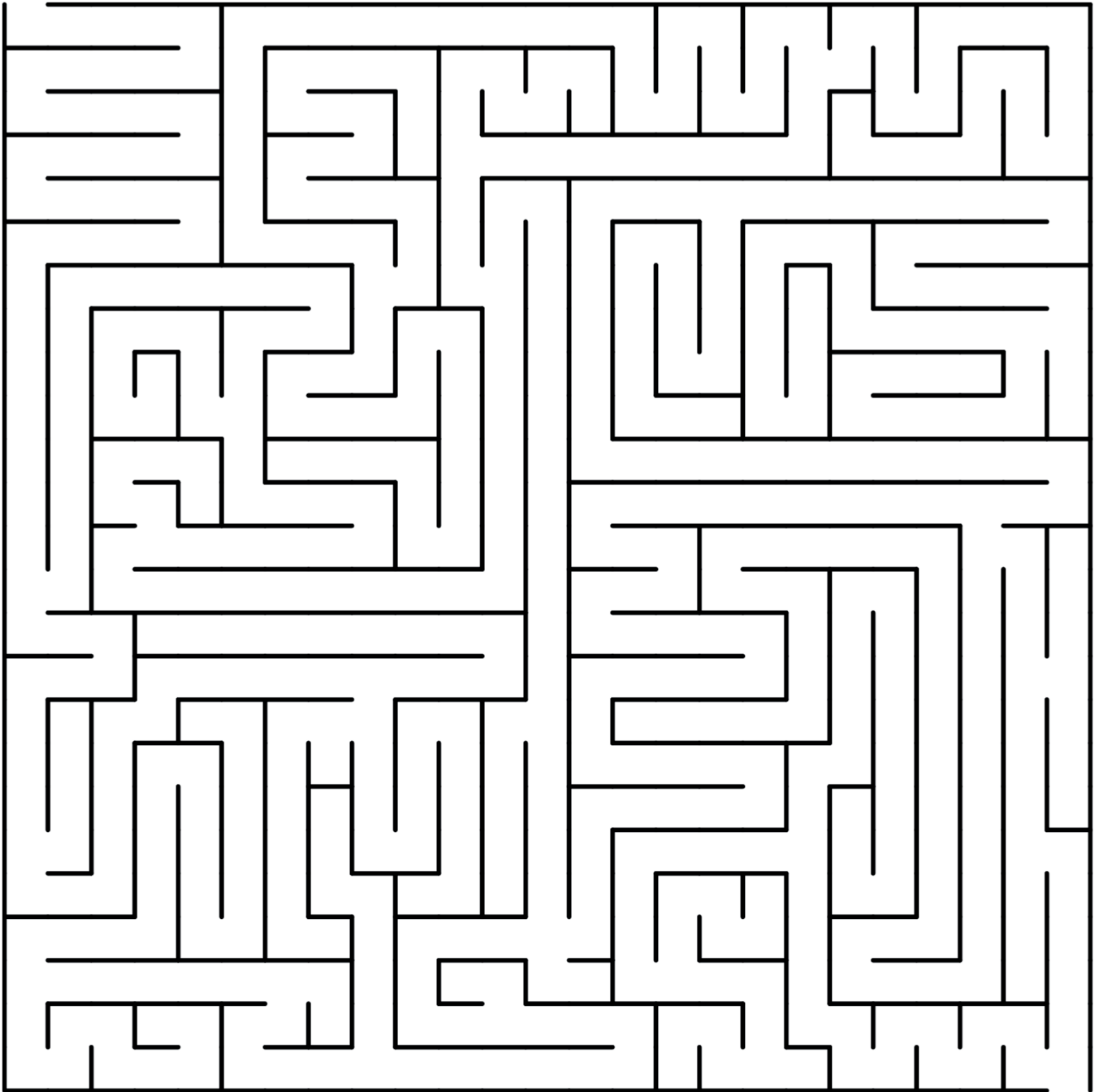

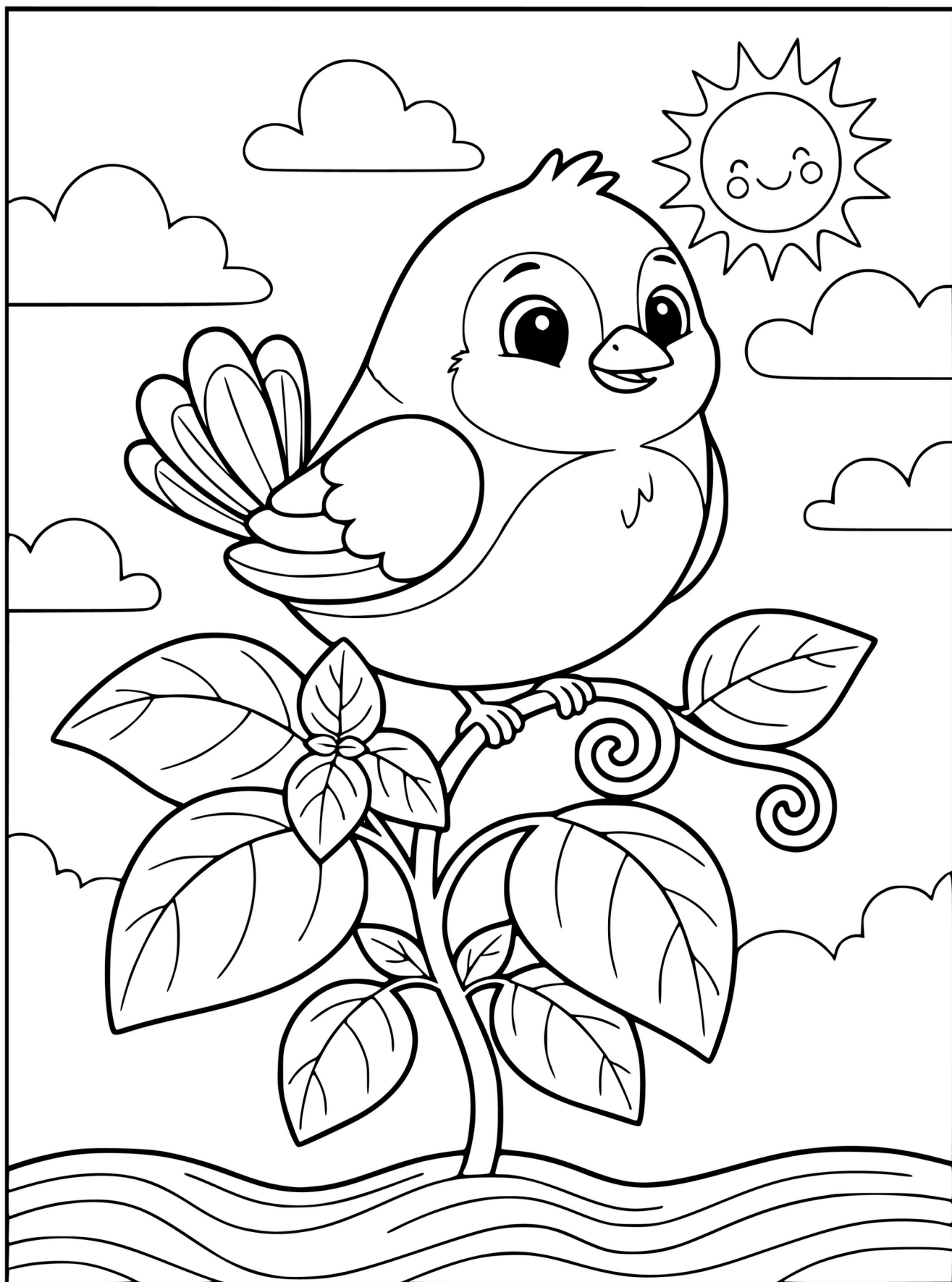
